

During the Cold War, the Canadian government considered homosexuality to be a threat to national security.

Love in a Dangerous Time: Stories of Resistance from Canada's LGBT Purge draws on first-hand accounts to tell the story of how, from the 1950s to the 1990s, LGBTQ2+ members of the Canadian military, Royal Canadian Mounted Police and federal civil service were investigated, interrogated and removed from their jobs. The exhibition will also explore how LGBTQ2+ people resisted this "purge" through political activism and successful legal challenges that expanded human rights protections for all Canadians.

Encouraged to rethink the history of the Canadian state through a queer lens, visitors will also be inspired to help create a future in which the rights of LGBTQ2+ people are respected. This important story – brought to life through rich interpretive and mixed-media elements – looks at what can happen when rights are violated, and the power of those who resist injustice.

Components

This exhibition is currently in development. The travelling exhibition will include:

- All artifacts. Loan agreements for the artifacts will be the responsibility of the CMHR;
- Images, audio soundscapes, graphics, AV projections, digital interactives and accessibility features;

- All physical graphic/environmental components (venues will be required to produce single-use graphics).
