Explanations for significant variances compared to the previous fiscal year

As of March 31, 2017, the Museum aligned its policies and practices to the Treasury Board policies, directives and related instruments on travel, hospitality, conference and event expenditures.

Travel: Compared with fiscal year 2016-17, travel expenditures increased in 2017-18 mainly due to increased travel expenses to support public programming, including the new Historic Apology Series and the unveiling of the new \$10 bill which features the Museum.

Hospitality: Compared with fiscal year 2016-17, hospitality expenditures for 2017-18 are at the same level with no significant variances.

Conference Fees: This is the first year the Museum is classifying conferences and training costs separately, following the application of the revised Travel, Hospitality, Conference and Event expenditures policy and procedures.
